

Did you know?

An automatic lubricator, a device to pump oil to the engine of a ship or locomotive by using steam pressure, was a time-saving invention of Elijah McCoy. He was born in Canada, the son of former slaves, and lived right here in Harrow, Essex County.

His invention provided engines with a gradual and constant release of oil to engines, preventing overheating. He was granted his patent in 1872, and a second patent for an improvement to the design in 1874. Others copied his design, but their products were deemed inferior, and those in the know always wanted his design which was, after all, "the real McCoy".

From the archives of the Amherstburg Echo... 1888-89

August 3rd, 1888

The most terrific storm that has been known for years visited our village last Tuesday evening. Trees were blown down, and the telegraph line between Harrow and Sacksville was badly injured. Thomas Ferriss was stunned slightly, Charles Knapp was severely shocked and Mrs. Joseph Drummond. who was on her way from Kingsville, was so severely shocked that she is under the care of Dr. Mitchell and unable to leave her bed.

Mrs. Ann Fox's barn was struck. Several neighbours were there and all were shocked, especially Anthony Marantette, who happened to be sitting on the horse rake.

Lightning struck a horse belonging to John Richmond in the open field and killed him. He was worth about \$125 and was insured in the London Mutual with Chas. Bell & Bro.

Dec. 21st, 1888

George Pook and T. Herniman started for England on a visit to their native homes. They went by the White Star line and will return in the spring.

March 1st, 1889

There will be a grand concert given in the town hall, Harrow....by Theophilus Crosby and wife, Joseph McCurdy and wife, and others.....proceeds to go to the AME Church at the central grove.

April 26th, 1889

Seven buildings are being erected in Harrow, foundations are in for 2 more, and James Murray and John Anderson will soon begin to build. Sylvester McLean has sold part of 8 lots on Maple Avenue, Harrow, to Henry W. Allan, and one lot each to Sarah Murray, John Anderson and Robert Montgomery, on McAfee Street.

May 4th, 1888

Judson Ferriss shot a baldheaded eagle. It weighed eleven and a half pounds and measured 7 feet, 4 and a half inches from wing tip to wing tip.

March 29th, 1889

The appearance of this town has wonderfully improved since the opening of the RR. The streets are lined with farmers' teams and everything looks like business.

The merchants are all busy and happy; in fact, every citizen seems to be pleased with his present surroundings, and Harrow will be, in my mind, the best village along the lake shore.

It is situated in the midst of the best farming lands in Essex and with the advent of the RR, a bright future is before it, and while all are busy, there is yet room for other investments, and any man who is desirous of finding a good opening for a business of any legitimate kind cannot do better than visit Harrow and examine it's capabilities before deciding on any other town.

The business men are courteous and willing to give any information and visitors cannot help being pleased with the bright, clean little village and the kindness and civility of it's citizens.

May 17th, 1889

Silas Brush has bought out Jason Fox's share in the saw mill and has entered into partnership with Eli McLean in the saw mill, planing mill and lumber business. A vessel load of lumber will arrive at Hackett's dock about June 1, for the new firm.

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Tomahawks & Treaties

- by Rex Callaway

The settlement of the Ohio River Valley was a bitter contest between Native Americans who had inhabited that region for centuries and settlers from the east eager for new land and opportunity.


Micajah Callaway's life story is a perfect backdrop to expand on the series of historic incidents that unfolded around him during these exciting and dangerous times. From the vantage point of an ordinary man caught up in the middle of an extraordinary chain of events, the author, his direct descendant, has described the battles, broken treaties, politics and intrigues that characterized the relationships between the conflicting parties on both sides.

Born near Lynchburg in Bedford County, Virginia, Micajah's family included Uncle Richard and brother Flanders, both of whom were members of Daniel Boone's famous trailblazing party that cut the Wilderness Road into Kentucky and founded Boonesborough in 1775. In the Spring of 1777, Micajah ran away from home to join a militia company that marched to the relief of Boonesborough. He then enlisted in Captain Daniel Boone's KentuckyCounty militia company that was captured by Shawnee Chief Black Fish and his warriors while they were making salt at the Lower Blue Licks.

Daniel Boone and Micajah were subsequently adopted into the Shawnee Nation. While Boone escaped to return to, Micajah lived on with the Shawnee for several years, learning their language and customs in the process. He later returned to his former world and served as a scout and interpreter for Brigadier General George Rogers Clark, Major General Richard Butler, and Major General "Mad Anthony" Wayne. As a result, Callaway became an active participant in the ensuing diplomatic negotiations and treaties that took place with the Shawnee Nation during the last quarter of the eighteenth century.

Striving for accuracy and authenticity, the author has included a series of 30 detailed maps, as well as photographs and artwork, in an effort to help the reader visualize the stage on which this drama took place.

This unusually well-researched and balanced account will be savored and enjoyed by readers who want an understanding of the issues encountered on both sides of the struggle for the Ohio River Valley. They will gain a thorough and objective view of the history of this area, and a greater sympathy and understanding for the survivors of the brave Shawnee Nation.

From the earliest days of his childhood Rex was immersed in family oral history stories about Daniel Boone, the Callaway family, and the late eighteenth



century Ohio River Valley Indian wars. He set out on a quest to research and validate the family oral history in 1997 and eventually focused his effort upon reconstructing the life story of his greatgreat-great grandfather Micajah Callaway.

Rex's research process reveals the compelling story of his life and times, and provides modern historians with heretofore unknown information about individuals that he was in contact with during his long and adventurous life.



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


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
