Dinner, Elections & Heirlooms... oh my!

The annual potluck dinner meeting of HEIRS was held on May 23rd. A delicious buffet-style meal with everything from meatballs to macaroni & cheese, fresh cherries, rhubarb pie & much more was enjoyed.

A short business meeting followed. Three of the directors had served their terms of service with HEIRS, but chose to let their names stand for re-election, and each was acclaimed by the group. The fiscal year ended in May, and a financial report was given by treasurer John Brush, which indicated a


















healthy balance of funds. President Richard Herniman announced that HEIRS has 35 new members on the year as the group becomes better known and more frequently visited. Following the business portion of the meeting, all adjourned to browse through the items on display, and enjoyed time to circulate and chat with fellow HEIRS members.

Elise Harding-Davis displayed a colourful quilt made for her by her sister, and explained the symbolism involved, as one red square of women figures showed her "warrior" attitude, and another indicated her tenacious spirit. This is a one-of-a-kind family treasure, & we thank Elise for sharing it with us.

Peter Timmins brought in 2 items from his very large collection of farming antiques, a pair of old tractor seats from models long out of production. We are told Peter has one of the largest collection of this type anywhere.

Richard Herniman displayed a group of old plumbing fixtures & a 4-piece grouping of Blue Graniteware items, from the early 1800's. The centerpiece of the grouping was a strange looking item which was an early model of a bedpan for male hospital patients. He indicated that this is a quite unusual item, rarely found.

Also on display were some 8-track tapes, Mad magazines, a few old 33 1/3 RPM record albums, an early model electric iron with attached sprayer, and a set of photos of member Mark Fox's 1923 Ford Model T.

Sisters in the Wilderness


Susannah Moodie and her sister Catharine Parr Trail, were born in England in the early 1800s. Both dreamed of becoming writers, and each came to Canada in 1832 with her husband. Leaving genteel British life behind, they found themselves having to cope with life in the unsettled wilderness that was early Canada.


Their letters back and forth with family members in England and with each other, since they did not live close to one another, are a revealing glimpse of how difficult those early times were.

In spite of hardship, accidents, illness, and

near starvation, they persevered and recorded their struggles. It is a valuable and fascinating read, or if you wish, you can borrow the DVD from HEIRS and enjoy this true Canadian pioneer story in that mode.







Planted by the Waters - A Genealogy

HEIRS offers for your enjoyment, this paperbound book by Hilda Dungy. This 49 page book, with many photographs and family charts, tells the story of a family whose founders were blacks who wound up in the Buxton area to settle. One grandfather, Josiah Jones, escaped from slavery in Kentucky, and reached Chatham Township via the Underground Railroad, about 1847. He married Susan Brown, a caucasian woman, whose family moved from the Niagara area to Chatham Township.

The other grandfather was John Walker Carter, born in Woodstock, Ontario, of free Negro parents who had never been slaves. John married Harriet Cornelia Dyke, a former slave in Virginia. Through the years family members settled at various points in Kent County, including Chatham & Dresden. Family members connected to these lines will learn much from this detailed book.

Petitions for a walk on the north side of King from Queen to Victoria; on the east side of McAffee Avenue, from King to the Fair Grounds; on the south side of Wellington from the Fair Grounds to Erie Street.

The foundation of the new canning factory is completed & blocks are being laid. The machinery has been shipped & will be installed as the work proceeds. The managers expect to be able to take care of this season's crop.

August 15th

The big union (Sunday School) excursion from Harrow to Belle Isle was the biggest of its kind on record-600 leaving this point. The day was spent on the island and in Detroit, with no mishaps to mar the outing.

August 22nd

The Beaver Oil & Gas Co. has been to Harrow negotiating for a franchise to lay pipe & supply natural gas in Colchester South. They met the council & the Businessmen's Association. The company proposes to lay a line along Concession 2, & supply gas at 25 cents per thousand cubic feet, \$1 a year to rent the meter.

As a summer resort, Oxley & all along the Colchester lake front has become one of the most popular. The excellent home cooking, prime fruit & vegetables, & first class dairy products, light & airy rooms, fine bathing beaches & boating, & the picturesque scenery have attracted large numbers of pleasure seekers from the American cities along the border, & every house is filled to capacity.

The board & rooms are reasonable, being rated from \$5 to \$7 per week. The auto bus from Amherstburg, driven by Lewis Fox, & James Drummond's livery bus from Harrow, give excellent service, & the fares are very reasonable. They will be kept busy until Labour Day. Beside bathing & croquet, the young folks have dances in the Woodsmen's Hall (Colchester Village), marshmallow toasts, & other social gatherings. The Harrow merchants promptly supply the resort with the best wares in their lines. The proprietors of the boarding houses are very courteous and obliging. Tour the Thames from another view

Sure, you've seen the Thames River. But from a historical view? The 1812 Tour Along the Thames is scheduled for June 8, but events like this tend to sell out quickly.

Hosted by Windsor's Community Museum, the tour offers a sense of local history and scenery. It costs \$80 per person or \$150 for two people and is available for pick up and drop off in Windsor and in Essex.

Highlights include a guided tour by bus along the Thames, featuring the last days of the native leader Tecumseh, stops at points of interest such as Park's Blueberries and Country Store, a farm tour, Chatham-Kent Cultural Centre, Tilbury Antique Mall. Tickets include transportation, tours, site visits and lunch.

Resource Centre Yearly Report 2012-2013

The number of signed in visitors to HEIRS for the current year is 120, a slight increase over the past year by 20; the number of email requests is consistent at approximately 120 requests.

Land Registry documents have been entered into our data base, and the documents for Kingsville and Gosfield North and South were transferred to Kingsville Archives earlier this year.

Our weekly volunteers include Nancy Murphy, Karen Hernandez, Jeff Wood, Doug Horne and a recent addition, Mary Paquette; HEIRS is grateful for their contribution to our society over the past year.

Our summer students, Andrea Leslie and Katharine Maag completed the tasks outlined for them. We look forward to one student for the current year.

The two part Elder College course outlined by Ted Steele along with Kathy and Pauline was successful in that HEIRS obtained 10 memberships, as well as community exposure to our society; a basic genealogy course will be offered in the Amherstburg area this coming Fall.

Projects during the year included a publishing of the James Bell Letters through the efforts of Edith Woodbridge, as well as information to Margaret Derry for the publishing of her book, titled Dream of my People, a book about the Bell and Shay families during the early 1900's.

Future projects include how to preserve our genealogical files, map files, photograph collection in a digital format.
