
HEIRS' final meeting of 2017 happens to fall on American Thanksgiving Day this year.

We meet this time to welcome speakers Cris Kohl and his wife, Joan Forsberg, two well-known Great Lakes Maritime historians.

They have explored many wrecks scattered on the bottom of our Great Lakes, & in other areas. Cris spoke to us in early 2016 on the search for La Salle's ship, the Griffon, missing for over 200 years, and we are very delighted that they are returning to HEIRS.

This time they will have a video presentation, "The Wrecks of the Pelee-Colchester Area", with many local history connections to Essex County.

Some of their DVDs & books on their diving adventures will be available for those starting their Christmas shopping at HEIRS.

The October 26th meeting was special for a number of reasons.

We were able to team up with the Essex Municipal Heritage Committee to present Doug Robinson (aka Seamus Gunn) as our speaker, and the meeting was held at 6:30 PM rather than our usual 1:30 PM start time.

We were very pleased to see a full house in attendance, as Seamus explained that he would be giving an inside history of the events leading up to Canada's Confederation, and promised that it would be anything but a series of dates and events.

In his usual light-hearted style, he introduced some of the leading characters in the story and made each of them come to life, warts & all.

Colonel John Prince, Arthur Rankin, George Brown, Georges Etienne Cartier and John A. MacDonald were some of these folks. Their clashing personalities made for interesting tales. No hero-worshipping here, (in true Canadian style), we learned of John A.'s legendary drinking escapades, the "alleged" bribes between Arthur Rankin and two

expanding railway companies, the rancor and personal animosity between George Brown and MacDonald, and more.

The way these dynamic personalities were able to come together and form a nation was explained in an entertaining style, with Seamus also boosting our national pride & patriotism along the way.

Recent events made me pause to think how fragile some things really are...

In the past year, two separate computer crashes posed a threat to my massive files, but in both cases, the important materials were backed up. Then, the Steele cottage at Rondeau Park recently burned to the ground; no one was injured, but nothing could be saved at all. It was in the family 69 years, and is now completely gone.



One of the first things my brother, its current owner, said to me was... "Dad's photo albums were in the desk".

I reassured him that I had scanned them all and the images were safe.

The furniture, appliances and clothing were gone, but our photos and memories live on.

Following our September meeting, at which I spoke about penny postcards, two HEIRS members loaned me their postcard collections to copy. A 3rd member is considering doing the same, and last week Director Roger Sinasac made his collection available to me as well. This will not only enrich the files at HEIRS, but it also helps ensure that these items will not be lost in a sudden emergency like a fire.

If you wish, HEIRS can duplicate your items & return the originals to you. A one-of-a-kind item may be at risk of being lost forever - and it can happen quickly. If duplicate copies are around, they will likely survive into the future. Any family members or researchers will then continue to have access to them, once copied.

Help us build a comprehensive file of information & photos dealing with the two World Wars.


If you have any family information to contribute, we would like the opportunity to copy it for our records.

While Canadian soldiers were overseas, the women of Harrow & Colchester South formed the Women's Patriotic League & the Imperial Order Daughters of the Empire (IODE). They sent packages of baked goods, scarves, mittens, socks, bandages & cigarettes to the men from this area.

A lady living on Maple Street in Harrow received a thank you note from a soldier in Germany ...

"Socks received, some fit!

I used one for a helmet,
and the other for a mitt.

I must say, dear lady,
You've done your bit,
But where in the Hell
Did you learn to knit?"





The young farmers of this community are likely to have the opportunity of attending an Agricultural Short Course conducted under the auspices of the District Representative in Harrow during the winter months. Subjects: farm bookkeeping, drainage, seed selection, stock judging, be keeping, soils, moisture and topics on scientific and practical agriculture.

November 12

Residents of Harrow and Colchester South have joined in the protest against all the fine whitefish from Lake Erie going to the American consumers, to the detriment of local trade. They want fisheries to supply local persons who visit the fisheries. People have to go on putting up with the high cost of living and meat-less, fish-less Tuesdays and Fridays.

November 16

Quality Canners finished up their sweet corn run on Wednesday and are getting ready to can pumpkin until cold weather sets in; then they will can pork and beans, and continue that all winter. 25 to 30 hands are employed. The Clark Co. Received a car or 2 of tomatoes in bulk and are busy putting them up.

The Victory Loan campaign is gaining force. Rev. J. E. Russ and F. H. Ferriss are making the canvass, and have met with good success.

The name of E. H. Conn of Harrow was among the wounded. Son of Milton Conn of Marshfield who came here 3 years ago from Ohio. He joined the 99 Battalion, and has been in France nearly a vear.

Contractor James McGill has the bridge over Cedar Creek practically finished, the floor having been laid on the steel framework. This bridge was built under great difficulties, and the county officials who inspected it declare that it is a big job well done.

November 30

Howard Heaton, who has been on Pelee Island for 2 months looking after the Heinz pickle industry, returned home to interest farmers here in the cauliflower raising industry. He wants 100 acres of marshland to be devoted to this next year. The production is from 4 to 7 tons per acre, and the company is offering \$50 per ton.

Reviewing Some of The Treasures of HEIRS ...

As we all know, print media is slowly dying. To many of us, it is sad to see, yet understandable.

Advertising increases, to pay the costs of production, and content decreases. The same trend is overtaking most magazines. There are exceptions to that trend, however.

HEIRS selects a few magazines to subscribe to; these offer content of quality and interest on a regular monthly basis and are worth both the cost and the time to read.

One of the best of these, in my opinion, is "Canada's History". Formerly called "The Beaver", each month it offers articles on Canadian history topics which are often either completely unknown or little understood. The most recent issue featured stories appropriate for the Halloween season - a "ghost ship" abandoned in the far North, yet spotted drifting on its own for decades.



Another story discusses the need for cadavers to further medical research, an ancient tradition called "Mummers", and a French-Canadian folk tale of a supernatural "Flying Canoe" used as part of a "deal with the Devil".

An article of interest to me pointed out how fortunate those of my generation were (born in the early 1940s) to enjoy 'trick or treating", as we came along at just the right time to benefit from the relaxing of wartime rationing of sugar. This allowed the candy companies to boost the whole Halloween tradition. I had no idea before reading this.

Thumbing through the pages of any of these issues, one finds stories on recently discovered artifacts, or how fur-bearing animals like



beavers were successfully hunted in pioneer times. Or what life was like as a young wife and mother during Canada's early years, or how women in wartime took to the factories and produced the necessities for our military to continue the war effort in Europe.

Many times an article strikes me, and it either appears as part of an HEIRS newsletter, or it is filed to be used later in one of our monthly meetings.

This is one publication well worth its cost, but HEIRS members can come in and borrow it from our library at any time.
