Our October meeting, as always, will be focused on Remembrance Day, since it is the last one before that observance.

We will meet to hear HEIRS President, Richard Herniman and new HEIRS member Bonnie Storey tell us of the early life and career of Canadian icon, John McCrae.

We all know him from his classic poem, "In Flanders' Fields", but little is generally known about his early life, and how he actually came to write his now-world famous creation.

Richard has had an abiding interest in John McCrae, and knows quite a bit of his story; Bonnie is actually a relative of the McCrae family, and can tell us of the family's story as the 20th century began. This should be an inside look at a young man who lost his life too soon, and how his writing will ensure that he will forever be remembered. *Please join us*.

September

On September. 24, HEIRS met to hear Ruth Nicholson, UE tell us of the 1812 Veterans Plaque Program through the Federal Government.

With her sister Susan McCloskey Hutchins, Ruth was able to place plaques for 2 Harrow area veterans this past spring. She recounted the story of Isaac Ferriss, who as a teenager, volunteered to swim the Detroit River to Boblo Island, in order to spy on occupying American forces in 1813. He succeeded at great risk and brought valuable information back to British commanders. He continued to serve through the remainder of the war as well.





William Hutchins was a ship-builder at the King's Navy Yard in Amherstburg and served with the Militia in 1812-14. Both are buried in the Harrow area, and their resting places are now adorned with the 1812 veteran plaque, honouring their service to the Crown.

Ruth pointed out that the cost is a mere \$10, and one need not be related at all to the veteran being honoured - proof of his service and location of his gravesite are the main requirements. For more information, you can go to www.1812veterans.ca, or come in to HEIRS for the application information.

Though Canada was not formed as a nation until Confederation in 1867, these brave soldiers are among the earliest heroes of Canada's history. The British government offered pensions for veterans, but was extremely slow to approve and issue them - some were old men who eventually received it, but the majority died before it was ever made available.

The Riel Rebellion


The HEIRS lending library has some hidden gems in it, waiting to be discovered by our members. Many history and genealogy topics are represented, but it is easy to assume that they do not connect with you personally. A bit of detective work could prove you wrong, and set your family tree researches in a different direction.


Most of us know the building of the Trans-Canada Railway brought the western provinces into Confederation rather than joining the United States. Did you know it also allowed the Federal government in 1885 to send troops westward to put down the Metis Rebellion led by Louis Riel?

Militia and Northwest Mounted Police were able to quickly get to the embattled area, along with their artillery and various weapons, so that the rebel forces were rapidly outnumbered and hopelessly outgunned. Young men from Ontario joined up to go west to fight, and some remained there to settle. My distant cousin, George Wellington Steele, was one. His branch of the family tree is in Manitoba today.

The book, "The Riel Rebellion: A Biographical Approach", points out the views held by the Metis that their rights has been ignored, and their land claims invalidated. Their attempts to reach a settlement with the Canadian government were dismissed and they had little choice but to take a stand and fight. At the end of the conflict, the Indians were beaten militarily and spiritually, their culture all but erased, and many of their leaders executed, some without sufficient grounds.

This paperbound book of 154 pages with an index, is an easy to read narrative of events which brings fairness to both sides of the issue. as both sides must share in the blame for what happened. It is an overlooked but important part of our history, though it does reflect poorly on official treatment of minority groups.





The Liberation of Holland - Video

Most Canadians know that the Dutch consider Canada to be their best friend, and that it somehow connects with WW 2.

The D-Day landing included the Essex Kent Scots, and they took part in fighting their way with other Allied forces, through France, at Falaise and Caen, then into Belgium and Holland.

The Dutch had been brutally occupied by the Nazis, and starvation was common. In large measure it was the Canadian troops who liberated them, and they have never forgotten that debt

Their children are still taught to respect that debt of gratitude, and Canada holds a place of honour in Dutch hearts yet.

The HEIRS Lending Library DVD called "The Liberation of Holland" helps to tell the whole story, and the Essex Kent Scottish were an important part of it. Combining archival footage with re-enactments and interviews with veterans who took part and Dutch citizens who survived, this is a glimpse of what our fathers and brothers and uncles may have been a part of.

It provides us the facts on Canadian heroism, and will make any viewer proud to be a Canadian, for our soldiers paid the price and did what had to be done. This is also an excellent video to share with young family members, so that the story is passed along. **We Canadians do have our heroes too.**

This video runs just under 60 minutes, and can be borrowed from the HEIRS lending library by its members.



October 1

The butter factory is still running full blast, though the early frosts indicate that pasture may soon fail. This has been a great season for cream and butter, owing to the rains, and the amount made will exceed by a half that made in any other year. At the same time, the price has kept up well.

Two meetings have been held at the office of the canning factory to try to come to some arrangements with those who grew tomatoes for the factory last year and who have not yet been paid. At the first meeting, when nearly all the creditors of the factory were present, the management made an offer of 35 cents on the dollar now, 15 cents on the dollar next spring, and the balance in the fall.

This was refused, the creditors holding out for 50 cents on the dollar now. Last week, another meeting was held, when an offer was made of 15 cents on the dollar now, 35 cents in the spring, and the balance next fall.

October 15

The liquidator from Sarnia sent notices to creditors, but only a small percentage will be paid.

October 29

The Council gave \$200, and then authorized a canvass of the whole township for Red Cross support.

Starting in the last of November, Thomas Ferriss, the veteran postmaster, will cease carrying the mail between the station and the Post Office, giving this task to John Ridsdale, drayman.

Mr. Ferriss and his little push cart have been popular objects on the street for so long, that they will both be missed.
