

Dr. Collins has rented the Heaton block and will occupy the upstairs both as a residence and as an office.

Charles Richardson of the hardware company, died at Cedar Beach. Honorary pallbearers Thomas Ferriss, A. L. Munger, T. R. Flood, A. L. Ferriss, William Hughson & Henry Herdman. Acting pallbearers were Charles Clark, C. F. Smith, W. H. Ferriss, A. Brush, J. A. Secord, & E. F. Darby. Cortege had 65 autos & many other vehicles. He was a native of Colchester South; his only sister surviving is Mrs. Lucinda Atkin of Leamington, now 87. When Charles was quite young, he apprenticed to the late Walter Pulford of Leamington, in the woodworking and blacksmithing business.

He remained there for several years, & first took up business for himself in the village of McGregor, where he stayed for 7 years. He went from there to Thamesville where he carried on business for 10 years. When he came to Harrow, he went into the hardware business on the W. G. Wright corner. In 1901, his son Frank entered the firm, known as C. Richardson and Son, and built a beautiful building. He was married in 1870 to Miss Alzora Pulford, daughter of the late Henry Pulford of Kingsville, & they had a family of 5 children, 3 of which died young. He was active in the Methodist Church, on quarterly board.

September 29

A large amount of cucumbers is being taken in at the Heinz factory, although nothing like last year. This summer was dry.

Alvah Munger, manager of Bell telephone, had been ill for 2 years. For years he ran a stationery store & watch repair. When Bell Telephone came, he was resident manager, & did some of the repairs himself. He was son of John G. Munger, who gave the town its early name of Munger's Corners.

His brothers & sisters living are: Arthur of Harrow; Judson & Herman, Mrs. Frank Whitney & Mrs. James Helfrich of Michigan. He married Hattie Rosebrugh; their children were Daisa (Mrs. John Forsyth of Royal Oak, Mich,), Ina (Mrs. Norm Wright of Harrow), Effie (Mrs. John McDougall of Winnipeg), Guy & Leo at home, Fannie (Mrs. Pat Wright of Colchester South. A number of the Rosebrugh family from St. George, Ontario were at the funeral.

"History As It Used to Was"

A fairly well-known old custom is the "shivaree" or "chivaree".

It appears in movies or TV shows from time to time, especially those set in the pioneer days.

I recall an episode of The Waltons which featured the idea. It is usually depicted as a loud, boisterous and unmusical celebration held as a newlywed couple settle down for their first night together. Supposedly designed to interrupt the proceedings and force the couple to instead host a party, those involved are assumed to be friends playing a practical joke to welcome the new couple to married life. It apparently could feature "friends" removing all the labels off the canned foods, salt in the couple's bed, and impromptu wheelbarrow rides down the main street of town. It is just a good-natured way to embarrass the couple and have some fun at their expense. **This had always been my idea of it's meaning, but not so!**



Dating back to medieval times in Europe, the shivaree was actually a protest - held to make known public opposition to a marriage of which general society did not approve. Often this would be a marriage occurring too soon after a spouse had died & not been 'properly mourned', or when a young girl married a much older man; the impropriety might cause a demonstration to humiliate the couple & show contempt by their neighbours. In cases of severe disapproval, the couple might be dragged out of their home & forced to join the activities, at times even being paraded around town on a donkey in shame. This was often referred to as a "Skimmington", or "riding the Skimmington". In some cases, the couple had to move away to escape the anger of townspeople.

The custom was not approved of, but so long as no person or property was injured, authorities seemed to look on it as a "peaceful protest". It gradually evolved into what we call an impromptu party, often with similarities to our Hallowe'en trick or treating. The noise, silliness & embarrassing activities might end sooner if partiers were just given beer, food & encouraged to then, go home.

The custom is rare today, but echoes of it remain; after all, have you not seen tin cans tied behind a car departing for a honeymoon, "Just Married" signs on it & car horns announcing the newlyweds?

Echoes of the past, but as more & more couples live together before marriage, sometimes for years, the impact of these custom is fading quickly as well.
