On the 1st day of Autumn, Robert and Deb Honor of Amherstburg, UEL descendants and active in several historical groups in Essex County, will speak to HEIRS members about the "Bellevue House".

They will update us on efforts to save this palatial home built by Robert Reynolds along the Detroit River near Amherstburg between 1816-1819. It was designed by Robert's sister Catherine Reynolds.

Catherine was an important landscape artist from that time, providing an invaluable record of early 19th-century life in Upper Canada. Bellevue was the largest home in Upper Canada at that time.

The building has been very controversial with decades of ill repair, since being declared an historic site.

The property is now up for sale & may be headed for oblivion. Its beautiful location makes it a prime realty site for condominium development.



The "Friends of Bellevue" hope a local movement to save the home may result in some government-sponsored initiatives.

Join us in September to hear much more on this story and how you can help support the efforts to save this historic building! The May meeting of HEIRS, our last before summer, was held on May 26, and featured the annual election of Directors.

Our student will assist visitors with their research, answer phone queries, organize and update our files, as well as scan documents for our collection.


Take advantage of the extended hours this summer at the Resource Centre!



June 2 The Oddfellows hope to move into their new lodge about the end of June. The dedication has not been arranged yet. Final financial payments have been arranged through A. Agla.

June 9 Dominion Canners have been in Harrow looking for a site for a cannery.

June 16 Piano recital of Mrs. Madill's pupils at the store., Crowded, with standing room only.

C. N. Tofflemire died, born on a farm below Oxley in the year 1836, son of Charles and Salome Snider, and he was the grandson of Jacob Tofflemire. Deceased married Margaret Huffman; family of 12, 4 died young. Celebrated Golden Wedding Anniversary in 1910. A skilled wood carver, prominent Methodist, Class Leader and Supt. of the Sunday School at Oxley for 22 years.

June 30 Loss by fire of the planing mill & lumber shed is a serious loss to the village. Firemen were not able to save the plant, but saved the Smith & Johnson houses adjacent to it. Other mill men have offered to work up all the order for Mr. Smith, and a new plant will be equipped with more modern machinery driven by electric power. The mill was built 25 years ago, & bought by Mr. Smith from Mr. Zimmerman 8 years ago. Hose of fire equipment not heavy enough for this kind of fire.

July 7 The Fourth of July holiday brought one of the largest crowds in the history of the resort. From early morning, automobiles carrying capacity loads began to arrive from the city & by noon the place was thronged. Hundreds of motors were parked along the lake road in every available spot, & it taxed the hospitality of the boarding houses to take care of all the applications for meals & lunches.

July 14 John Knapp has recently been appointed keeper of the Colchester Light.

July 21 The canning factory will be ready for use in August;masonry is finished, 40 feet of the 125 foot chimney is in place, and erection of the 10,000 gallon tank will take place this week.

August 18 Eldah Harris has been appointed constable, due to some breaches of the peace.

August 28 Charles Cornwall, first of the Harrow boys killed in Flanders, aged 24; had worked in Imperial Bank in Harrow, then in Woodstock & Galt. Had been in France only 4 weeks.

"History As It Used to Was"

We have all seen many of the old movies, especially musicals set in the early 1900s, of straw hats and white suits, sweethearts taking Sunday strolls, and enjoying a free band concert at the town park. A quiet evening, pleasant music and a chance to actually converse with someone special, with NO electronics - seems too good to be possible, doesn't it? Not really!

A bit of investigating shows that many of our local communities continue the tradition. I know that Kingsville, for the past few years, has offered concerts on the lawn next to the former Carnegie Library on a weekly basis, and plans to hold them again this summer.



Starting June 13, the Colchester Centre Harbour Park offers free concerts every Monday night at 7:30, & on Wednesday nights beginning June 8, the Essex Centre Heritage Garden offers their concert series, also beginning at 7:30 pm; both run through the summer. Leamington is especially active in this program, as they have a Friday night concert at the Marina, Saturday night on the beachfront at Seacliff Park and Sunday afternoon at Robson Road Park. Local musicians perform, usually pop / folk music we all know, and



refreshments are usually available as well. A hot dog or two, while Dale Butler sings Johnny Cash or John Denver is not a bad afternoon!

My wife and I often make it a Summer Sunday by enjoying the afternoon concert (2-4 PM) in Leamington, followed by a fish and chip dinner at Wheatley Harbour, then off to Two Creeks Conservation Area on the edge of Wheatley. There, beginning at 6:30, we sit on the hillside near the band shell, and enjoy 2 hours of live music featuring British Invasion songs of the 60's, or good old rock and roll of the 50's & 60's, or Bluegrass, Country or Folk.

As twilight descends & the day unwinds, I realize that enjoying ourselves has very little to do with money!

Most of these events are totally free, although in a few instances they do "pass the hat". Events are planned well, bug-free (almost completely!) and remind us of why summer nights are so pleasant.

Check with your own community to see what they offer & take advantage of it. The Wheatley concerts begin Sunday, June 5th. Go on the internet and check the Community Events section for your area. **You'll be glad you did!!** **HEIRS Resource Centre**
